We live 2 miles north of Middleburg, on state route 104 north. As you get to the top of the highway. SAGUARO DAC CHAPTER HEARS STORY OF GERMAN SETTLEMENT IN VIRGINIA...
The story of the German sytlement on the banks of the Rapalan in the Colony of Virginia was told by Mrs. Kline Engle at the meeting Monday of Saguaro chapter, Daughters of the American Colonists.

A young bachelor from England arrived on June 20, 1710 to become Lietenant Governor of the Colony of Virginia. In due time the Honorable Alexander Spotswood acquired many thousand acres along the Rappahannack.

A small band of Germans set forth in 1713 on the long trek that would take them over land and ocean to a wilderness many miles distant. Mrs. Engle said.

In April 1714, 13 families established the first German attlement in Virginia. One of these familes was that of the Ref. John Henry Haeger. He was 70 years old and had retired as minister of the Reformed Church. He went to America and organized the first German Reformed Congregation and was its only pastor until he died in 1733.

The Colony underwent many hardships. Blood and tears went into the founding and building of this country. The Reformed Church was taken over by the Church of England and to t is day remains Anglican. Following her talk, Mrs. Engle showed colored slides of the location of the German Colony.
