RAYMOND F SHAMBAUCH, 153 West Locust Street, Wilmington, Chio gives us the following news of the southwest Chio Shambaughs-" I saw Uncle Joe ( Joe Shambaugh) yesterday. He has good health, but he has begun to fail. He is a great-grandpa , his daughter Grace ( Mrs Donald Henderson) has a grandson. I see Ernestine ( Mrs James Moore) and her husband in Wilmington about twice a week. Their son, Richard, is in college in this town. Their daughter Mary Lou is teaching school in Harveysburg. Howard Shambaugh ( Joe's son) bought a farm four miles out of Wilmington and is till in the turkey business, doing very well. Ella is still in Florida, while Agnes (Mrs J W Thompson) and Rachel (Mrs Parker) still in California. Dorothy is living near Harveysburg and Josephine (Mrs Fred Bogan) Lives below Waynesville. -My father's twin sister, Mrs Laura Hiatt) has a son and daughter living in this town. Aunt Laura seems well for a lady nearly 84 years old. Uncle Will's son, Ver non Shambaugh also lives here working for an implement dealer. I have four first cousins living in and around Wilmington and none left around New Burlington any more. My great grandpfather Joseph Shambaugh settled near New Burlington in 1823 and for 126 years there were Shambaughs in that vicinity. He came from Virginia in 1822, living for a year with Joshua Yoe. My grandfather, Levi Shambaugh was less than a year old when they arrived here.

THERT F. GURTHIE celebrated his 93d birthday on Feb. 19 and here is a newspaper story about him which Mrs F H Fortney has sent us. The article is by Catherine Rorick but we cannot give you the name of the paper- " His left leg amputated above the knee which has caused him to be hospitalized for most of the past year Henry F Githrie who was 93 years old Saturday, is an aggressive bed patient at the home of his niece and her husband, Mr and Mrs Fred Fortney, south of Galion. He makes it pleasant for those who care for him, and he entertains himself at nothing less that working problems of geometry and algebra. For his problems, he refers to an old Greenleaf textbook of which there are few left in the country. He payuses a heavy marking pencil in order to see his work and is also aided by glasses Perhaps his liking for mathelatics is due to the fact hetaught and a hand lens. school early in his life, served on a school board in Greene County, and was one of the pupils of the old Greene County Academy which then was located in Perrysville, Never having been married, and with no family of his own, plus his confinement, one would think Guthrie would have the 'blues', but his disposition is cheerful and he makes the best of his stiuation. Besides doing his problems, reads the newspapers, and he has been reading the Bible much in recent months. Because of impaired hearing, he listens only occasionally to the radio. It was little he than a year ago that an artery condition made it necessary for Guthrie to have the amputation. He was born in a farm two miles north of Perrysville, ( The old Guthrie homestead), and recalls when the old house was torn down, some of the logs went into the building or a home which now stends in Perrysville. He lived in Green townshil, Astland county, until 1939 when he sold his 94-acre farm, east of the old homestead. He had bought the farm early in life after having taught school several years. After his retirement, he came to the fortney home here for your years. Later he lived with a nephew at Parma, and then with another niece at Perrysville. "

Someone has written the book of John Shambaugh of Harrison County, Chio and from it we read as follows-

" John Shambaugh and heirs:" John Shambaugh, who was a farmer and representative of one of the oldest families ( Continued on next page)

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of Rumley Township, Harrison County, (Chio) was a son of George Shambaugh, who was a son of George Shambaugh, a native of Germany, who immigrated to Westmoreland Sounty, Pa. in an early day. He was a very successful and wealthy farmer, When he come to Ponnsylvania he brought his two sons, George and Philip With him. Philip Shambaugh married and had a son Jacob who served in the Revolutionary War for three years, he being quite a young boy when he entered the service—only 17 years old. An officer came to Jacob's father and demanded his team, consisting of four horses, one a three-year old colt, for use in the army. The father, however, did not want his team to go, but readily consented provided the officer would enlist the boy with the privilege of driving and caring for his team. The officer accepted the terms. The boy served his three years as teamster in the army, and upon his return home delivered back to his father his team, unharmed and in good condition. After Jacob's return from the army, Fhilip and his family moved to Maryland and all traces of that mambaugh family have been lost.

George Shambaugh, son of the first mentioned George Shambaugh, was born in

George Shambaugh, son of the first mentioned George Shambaugh, was book in Westmoreland County. Pa about 1745, He married Katherina Reder or Reger, whose parents also came from Germany. George and Katherina lived on Tulpehooken Creek in Berkes County, Pa during their early married life. Here their family was born, which consisted of seven children as follows: George, Jacob, John, Philip, Mollie Barbarboand tatherine. After a few years George and Katherina took their family and moved to Cumberland Gounty, Pa. George died in Perry County, that state, in 1827.

George Shambaugh, the eldest son of George and Katherina Reger Shambaugh, served in the War of 1812, and was a member of the state militia. He married Elizabeth Wirt, whose maiden name was Brown. She was the widow of Ludwig Wirt. Jacob Shambaugh married Sarah Hoobler. Barbara Shambaugh narried George C. Hokenhouse. John Shambaugh married Catherine Wirt (George's step-daughter). Catherine Shambaugh married Jacob Holtz of Richland County, Chio. Mollie Shambaugh married Wendell Brown. There is no account of whom Philip married.

John Shambaugh, whose history we are telling, was born Feb. 6, 1794. He lived with his parents in Pennsylvania and grew to manhood, having received an ordinary education in the subscription schools. The school house where he attended was built of logs with no floor, and windows were holes cut through the sides of the building with greased paper fastened over them to let the light in. In one end was a large fireplace by which the pupils warmed themselves, one side at a time. The chimney was only about five feet high. John Shambaugh married Catherine Wirt, who was born Oct. 24, 1796, and was the daughter of Ludwig Wirt. The Wirt children were: Elizabeth, who married Cotshal and he died; then she married Manbeck; John Wirt and Cotherine Wirt.

John and Catherine were married June 22, 1816. They waitedural the following year to take their honeymoon trip. With their baby boy they came with his brother George to Rumley Township, Harrison County, Chio, in 1817, and entered a farm comprising about 220 acres. The journey from Perry County to Rumley Township was made with a four-horse team and a large covered wagon, together with two cows, and it took two weeks to accomplish the journey. The land was then heavily timbered and a dense wilderness. They lived in their wagon until they could erect a small cabin, prepare a small piece of ground for garden, potatoes, etc., which required nearly two months time. They worked early and late, and in a few years, the land put on a more cultivated appearance, The forest gave place to pleasant places and fine meadow land, then the cabin was exchanged for a more commodious and comfortable dwelling. In the spring of 1830, John and Catherine decided to make a change and go to a farm by themselves. They were offered all the nice land along the Tuscarawas R., including the land where New Philadelphia is now located, for one follar an acre, but at that time the land was swampy and heavily timbered. It alise was supposed to be infested with malaria fever and the agus, and so he was afraid to take it, and bought a farm in Perry Township, Carroll County. Here he and his family gathered (Continued on next page)

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a good portion of this world's goods around them. To them were born a baker'sdozen of children, and they raised and educated them all to be good and useful men and women, with the exception of one son who died in infancy, but they raised thirteen children, nevertheless; they took a boy by the name of Jess Cathrell and raised and educated him just the same as if he had been their own child.

Their own children were as follows: Jacob, born March 15, 1817; Blizabeth, born March 24, 1819; William, born July 26, 1820; Sarah, born March 25, 1822; John born Nov. 27, 1824; Solomon, born Sept. 8, 1825; Catherine, born Sept. 26, 1828; Susan, born Sept. 13, 1829; Polly, born March 4, 1832; Margaret, born July 3, 1834; Hannah, born June 21, 1838; Rachel, born Aug. 19, 1840 and another who died in infancy.

John Shambaugh Sr as a neighbor was kind, hospitable and social, and in all his business transactions honest, and during his lifetime never owed to any one the sum of \$100. His wife, Catherine Wirt Shambaugh departed this life, Dec. 15m 1869. She was 73 years old. John lived on at the old farm awaiting his summons to come and join her. Twenty years after her death the "silent messenger" came on June 10 1889 when he was in his 96th year.
