FOREWORD....Beginning the actual issuance of our family record, I find that I have no guide to go by. This throws me back on my own interests and experiences. I was led to begin this venture because of my interest in the genealogical background of my parents. Out of this grew a desire to learn more about the historical facts related to my parentage. Third, I found that it was most interesting to meet and become acquainted with people who have at least a common interest with me because of blood ties. This line of reasoning has led me to set up the style of our News-Letter in three sections, as follows:

- I. Short biographical sketches of the participants in this venture, followed by a record of reported births, marriages and deaths.
- II. Genealogical facts, charts and studies of the Shambaugh family.
- III. Pertinent historical facts and data.

INTRODUCING OURSELVES..... We have to begin somewhere and so I will set the pattern of our thumb-nail sketches by giving my own...

Gleim, Harry Wilbur, son of Wm. Creigh and Ann E. (Shambaugh) Gleim; born May 26, 1888 on a farm near Arlington, then Brush Creek, in Fayette County, Iowa. Early education in a rural school one mile from his home. Graduated from the Arlington high school in 1909 and entered Iowa State College that fall in a dairy manufacturing course, completing the first two years. Married June 28, 1911 to Jessie Morris Simpson, daughter of George and Lizzie (Morris) Simpson, she born Sept. 28, 1894 near Elliott, Missouri. Was engaged in farming and breeding of pure-bred live stock from 1911 to 1919, leaving that field to found and operate a pure-bred live stock sales and pedigree organization. October 1, 1926 he entered the YMCA secretaranship as a profession and served, first as boys secretary at Fort Dodge, then four years as boys secretary at Burlington, coming back to Fort Dodge August 1, 1932 as general secretary. His church affiliation is Methodist, and he is a Democrat in politics. He is a member of the Kiwanis Club and of the Sons of the American Revolution.

- 1761- (date of birth of Philip Shambach, given by (4) *1777 I have record of this marriage*
- 1761- Dorothy Shambach married to Isaac Snyder.

**GERMAN FRENCH PENNSYLVANIA DUTCH** What IS our national origin? .... From the "Story of the Palatines" by Sanford H Cobb we read- \* In the autumn of 1685, Louis, incited thereto by the persuasion of Madame de Maintenon revoked the Edict of Nantes, by which Henry IV had given safety to the Huguenots and eighty years of prosperity to France. At once began the flight of the Refugees - best blood of France - to seek new homes in other lands. Many of them found a warm welcome with the Palatine and his people, against whom, for this act of harborage, the wrath of Louis' smoked like a furnace." The Palatinate was that section of Europe that may be somewhat vaguely stated as the states of Mainz, Treves, Worms, Alsace, Baden and Wurttemburg; boundaries subject to more or less of expansion and contraction, according as one or another of its little provinces became the spoils of war. Its lands lay on both sides of the Rhine, extending from the 50th to above Mannheim and containing somewhat less than 3,500 square miles. Many of the so-called Pennsylvania Dutch were former residents of the Palatinate and landed first, in New York where they were ill received and thence into Pennsylvania where they prayed that lands might be set aside for them on the Tulpehocken which lands they declared themselves ready and able to purchase. This petition was finally granted and the section watered by the Tulpehocken and the Swatara afforded a haven for these first American bound Palatines and later groups landed, first at Philadelphia and then moved immediately to join their former neighbors and friends.
