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THE SHAMBAUGH FAMILIES and THEIR CONTRIBUTION TO AMERICA

(The story of Daniel of Pennsylvania and Virginia and his children as related to us by Harry Gleim.-continued from the May issue)

Transport to

One of the outstanding traits of the Shambaughs has seemed to be their love of pioneering. Joseph, third son of Daniel, like his father in an earlier day felt the urge to go to a new land. Following the War of 1812 many persons from Pann avivania, Virginia and others of the eastern states turned their attention to the development of the Chic territory. Joseph was not the first Shambaugh to go into Ohio from Virginia, but he was the first to go as far west as southwestern Chio. With his wife (Anna Duffy b. 1796 d. 1831) whom he married Dec. 14, 1816 and two of his children, he set up his homestead near Kenis in Greene County in 1820. The two children who came to Chio with their parents were Franklin Augustus, born in 1818 and never marrying, living to the age of 29, and James Bernard, horn in 1819, living eight years. Levi Dright third child was born Nov. 8, 1821 and was the first to grow into maturity, marry and settle near his father and rear his family. Two of his sons, Joe H. and Lawson, both past 75 years of age, still live near New Burlington. Three other sons were born to Joseph and Anna Shambaugh-Joseph Jr, born in 1824 living until 1913; Daniel, who lived about a year; and, Benjamin, born in 1829 and living until 1894. This last named son was close to my own family, marrying into our immediate branch and being the father of Mrs Matilda Rice-Shambaugh who was raised in my grandparent's home. After the death of Anna D. Shambangh in 1831, Joseph married a second time, his new wife being Eleanor McDoneld whom he married in 1833. She was the mother of Isaac Newton, born in 1834 living untill907; Ann Elimabeth, wife of Reece Oglesbee born in 1836, living until 1916; Mary Catherine, born in 1837, dying in 1939, and Charles Wm born in 1841 and dying in 1866. Joseph Shembaugh was born Sept. 25, 1766, probably in Pennsylvania and died November 29, 1841. His body lies in the New Burlington cemetery. Most of this information has been given us by Joe H Shambauch, R F D # 3, Waynesville, Chio.

Our information about Benjamin, the fourth son of Daniel, is fragmentary. He seems to have died previous to the demiss of his father. From records on file we find names of four of his children, the oldest being Jonas Henry Shambanging who married Rebecca H Stephens March 10, 1826. We have record of Benjamin Shamp beigh marrying Isabella Van Nort July 27, 1821 which would seem to have been a second marriage. The youngest son of Daniel was his namesake who was born in 1787 and who married Rebacca Funkhouser, born in 1793. A family account states that young Daniel was well situated in the Shenandoch Valley and was accounted a prosperous Landowner with his fine brick house, but that he went security for a relative and lost most of his holdings. Isaac Newton, known as "Newt" studied law and was at one time state representative. I have always been interested in this man far it was apparent that all of the clan thought highly of him, one of my two uncles. I am reasonably sure, heing named after him. them intensely southern, but they were peace-loving and many of them left Virginia and went west to escape being embroiled in the war between the states which was in the making. Missouri was a border state and the two Shambaugh brothers, Newton and James found themselves in considerable difficulty as they tried to live a peaceful life in a turbulent time. We are indebted to M. Opal Fore, daughter of Mrs Rome Zimmerman for the information concerning this early Missouri pioneer family.

Our information concerning the daughters of Daniel Shambaugh is more meagre than that concerning the five sons. Two of them never married, Mary and Margaret, or Peggy and Polly as some accounts give their names. A third, Rachel seems to have married late, for the will of Daniel indicates that these three stayed with him and made his home in his last years. Mary's will filed at Front Royal, Oct. 13 mentions her sister Margaret, her sister Rachel and husband Jacob Houser, two nieces Catherine (Mauck) Derflinger and Elizabeth (Hammock) Rogers, and two neph ews, Jonas H S Mauck and W F N Houser, Margaret's will filed Jan. 5, 1860 leaves out Jacob and Rachel Houser, but includes Daniel C Shambaugh.

Rachel Tyson Shambaugh was born in 1808 and married Jacob Hamery Houser who was born in 1813. To this union was born William Franklin Newton Houser in 1842. Whether or not there were other children we do not know. The family moved west and settled near Nebraska City. Nebraska. The son seems to have been a brilliant young man and served in the Nebraska state legislature. He married Eugenia Kathleen Gant of Nebraska City and was the father of James Louis Houser, born in 1874; Carrie Tyson Houser, born in 1880; and Spancer Cant Houser, born in 1884. Family information in this case was given us by Francis Kathleen Houser, now Mrs Was E Douglas of Camas, Washington. A great-grandson, Louis Neveridge Houser lives in Chaha, Nebr.

Conderning Ann Shambaugh we know that she was married, first to a man named Hammock, and then Sept. 22, 1813 to John Crampton. We have record only of a daughter named Elizabeth Hammock who married John Rogers and who was the grand-mother of the recently deceased "Miss Betty" Rogers of Reliance. Virginia. Ann Shambaugh Hammock-Crampton is buried in the Shambaugh burying lot near Reliance.

We have several interesting letters in our files concerning Abigail Shambaugh who married Jacob Mauck, Sept. 24, 1817. She was the mother of two children, Jonas Henry Shambaugh Mauck who seems to have been named after a favorite nephew and Catherine who married Baylis Derflinger. Both of her children married, settled down and raised their families in Virginia. All three of the editors of the News-Lotter have contacted and talked with several of the descendents of Abigail Shambaugh Mauck still living near Reliance, Limeton, Riverton and other points close to the early Shambaugh clan locale. We are indebted to Win Branson Manck for much of our information converning the family.

Thus we find that at least five mid-western states have benefitted from the western drift of the descendents of this intrepid pioneer. Indiana, Chio, Iowa Missouri and Nebraska. True, none of these early pioneers have become great and famous as we commonly think of greatness and fame, but they have provided the foundation, or a part of the foundation, of common dependable American citizenry that has helped to make those states great. Like their encestor, they too have " carried the colors!"
