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## A GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

Clarence S. Shambaugh, 77, of 1639 West Bancraft St. in Toledo, Ohio died April 21, 1955 in Arrowhead Avenue Hospital for Convalescents. Mr. Shambaugh was chief clerk of the New York Central System here for several years prior to his retirement seven years ago. Before that, he was a traveling freight agent between Toledo, Buffalo and Chicago. He had been with the railroad for 50 years. Mr. Shambaugh was a native of Snyder Co., Pa., but had lived in Toledo most of his life.

Surviving are his wife, Catherine, son Merrill R. and a grandson. Services were held in the Walker-Wenner Mortuary with Mr. John C. Walker of the First Congregational Church officiating. Burial in Ottawa Hills Memorial Park.

Ed. S. Laughridge, 83, of route 2, Scio, Ohio, a retired Perry Tp. farmer died May 19, 1955 in a Carroll Co. hospital after an illness of six weeks. He was born Oct. 16, 1871, a son of the late William and Eschael (Shambaugh) Laughridge.

Surviving is a brother, Eugene of Albany, Wisc. His wife, Mrs Belle Laughridge preceded him in death.

Services were held in the Providence funeral home at Scio with Rev. Forest G. Nees officiating. Burial was in the Perrysville cemetery.
