Shambaugh Letter No. 2, from our Co-editor Harry Gleim -In 1936, Mrs Ira W. Shambaugh, who gained fame as Jessie Field the originator of the 1-H Club idea, introduced two people who were to join hands in developing Shambaugh History.

Shambaugh History.

It was evident that the writer of this sketch and Mrs Lois Shambaugh Castleberry of Houston, Texas had done a great deal of work an Shambaugh family lines. Her father was a Shambaugh, as was my mother. Even theugh the name appeared close up in both of our family lines, no close family ties could be found.

It was my privelege to the first real spade-work on the line to which I belong in Virginia in the spring of 1937. Lois and my interests in the family lin were quite different. Hine was to uncarth ancient data on the family, hers was to develope a real family tree with all twigs intact down to the present. However she did valuable service to both ideas and seems to have been one of those who came across the idea that the original name was thought to be Chambeau, or possibly Roc Chambeau. This tradition was also among some of my close relatives and others of their close kin.

We did later unearth the thought that the original name might have been Shambach, or Schambach. Since it appears well established that the original Shambaugh immigrants came to America from the Palatinate, it could well be that they Germanicised the name to hide their identity, a common practice of that day. We do have a statement of one walter J. Shambough that the original in his family was Chambeaux or Shambeaux and that his grandfather came from France.

Lois and I met on a Shambauch farm near Booneville, Iowa in the fall of 1937. To those of you who never met Lois, I found her to be a bundle of inexaustable energy and enthusiasm. We made the most of that afternoon visit. The hunt was on in real earnest and I sometimes wonder if some of the Shambaugh ancestors did not turn over in their graves.

By early 1938 we had also made contact with hiss Jessica Ferguson of the State Historical Library in Harrisburg, and his warren S. Bly of Doylestown. Pa. Still we did not know how we were related and thought of the Shambaughs as descended from a George, a Philip and a Daniel. Little did we realize the size of the big family of which we were members. Along about here Ursula Graff, as wife of one George Shambaugh and the Hendricks family into which a Philip and a Daniel had married turned up.

In the summer of 1939 hrs Castleberry and her daughter Katherine, made the Virginia trip and hrs Gleim and the writer made a repeat visit. We met for a while near Reliance, Va. at the United Bretheren Church near where my mother was born. On her return trip hrs Castelberry stopped at Fort Dodge where I was living and we spent some time in comparing data which by now was considerable. This was to be our last face to face contact before we met at the Loudenville Reunion in 1941, in Ohio.

As I reminisce over the early days of our search we seem to have tried to determine three things -

1 - Where did the Shambaughs originate ?

2 - What was their original name? 3 - How many Shambaughs came to America from overseas?

From all records available it became clear that the original Shambaugh's came from the Palatinate, that section of Germany on the upper Rhine from whence came so many of the so-called "Pennsylvania Dutch".

The original name is still in doubt but this writer is of the opinion that the major proof lies in the direction of Chambeau or something similar and that the origin of the family was France.

There seem to have been several Shambaughs who came to America and gave rise to our belief which later proved that one branch settled in Lancaster Co. and the other in Bucks Co. Pa. and that both were headed by a George. Just how these two original Georges were related has never been proven although my guess is that they were cousins.
