

WHICH BRANCH? At the Ashland Reunion there seemed to be confusion about the two branches of the Shambaugh Family Tree. At the risk of being repetitious we are here repeating some of our earliest published materials beginning with a few dates that have been established by Prof. W J Hinke in his book, "Pennsylvania German Pioneers" and in volumes of the Pennsylvania Archives.

1729- Adam, Anna Dorothy and Elizabeth Shambach arrived at Philadelphia from the

Palatinate via Rotterdam aboard the ship Mortonhouse.

1739- George Shambock obtains warrant for 100 a. of land in Philadelphia Co.

+ 1740- George Shambook obtains warrant for 150 a. of land in Bucks County. +1743- George Shambaugh obtains warrant for 40 a. of land in Bucks County

1749- George Shambach appears in the list of Palatinates who arrived in Philadelphia / on the ship Stl Andrew and took oath of allegiance to the government.

1750- George Shambaugh obtains warrant for 50 a. of land in Lancaster County.

1756- John Shambaugh obtains warrant for 5 a. of land in Perry County.

From this meager beginning three of us have spent much time and effort to make sonse out of the Shambaugh Family History. Until we know differently we have assumed that the two Georges named headed two different branches of our family and since the one purchased land in Bucks County and the other in Lancaster County we have designated the two branches as the Bucks and the Lancaster County branches.

Mrs Gervin has been making some recent studies into the families into which the Shambaughs' married and we begin this month a shory about Adam Reger whose daugh tor was the wife of a George Shambaugh whom we have indicated as the son of the George who purchased land in Lancaster County.
